REFORESTATION UPDATE

A majority of neighbors around Westwood Park have agreed to a replanting plan,

around the Westwood Pump Station Berm, funded and implemented by the Town of Perinton. This plan will allow 6 concolor fir trees from the southeast corner of the park (near the pump station) to be relocated to the west side end of Lake Crescent Park. These 6 fir trees are inappropriate in size for in their current location. Frank Fulreader has posted 6 pink flags to show where these 6 trees would be replanted to begin the replanting of the light and sound barrier along Lake Crescent Drive. He estimates \$1,350 to transplant these 6 trees. Additionally, Frank has quoted \$825 to transplant 3 Norway spruce trees (blue flags) and 1 swamp oak (lime flag) which are currently located in Lake Crescent Park in the grass adjacent to Fairport Road. With the exception of the swamp oak, this work is ideally should be done during this Fall's planting season, and should be completed by October 1. Transplanting these 10 trees, combined with the 5 evergreen trees to the west end of the Lake Crescent Park, where the colored flags are along Lake Crescent Dive, would go a long way toward creating a natural, appropriate and pleasing barrier for this area of the Lake Crescent Park for minimal cost to the Association. In the event the dredging, berm and planting on the berm in Lake Crescent Park is not done for a few years, the 10 transplanted trees would significantly provide for an improved light and sound barrier while still providing the Town access to the pond. Tom, Dick Ahern and Bill Shaw plan to speak with the affected neighbors on Lake Crescent Drive to obtain their approval on the location and transplanting of the trees. The Association wishes to thank Tom Hamilton, Tim Henry and all of the other neighbors involved for their time and efforts to move this process forward.
